Churches Together in Ross-on-Wye and District



50 years of collaboration keeps Luston Chapel open for worship

'Necessity is the mother of invention' has proved true in Luston. In 1974, Luston Methodist Chapel, pictured top left above, was closing due to falling attendance. What could be done to keep the chapel open?

It happened that the nearest Church of England church, St Peter & St Paul, was at Eye, about a mile away, down an often muddy lane. Rev'd Duncan Philips, Vicar at Eye then, wondered whether ministers from both faith groups could work together to keep the chapel open. Local Methodist ministers agreed to collaborate and thus began a system of alternating weekly services. 50 years on, and with the support of the Leominster Methodist and CofE ministry teams, Christians from both faith

communities continue to enjoy services at the chapel.


We asked two presiders about the secret of their success. Rev Paul Arnold (pictured, above right) is the Methodist minister in Leominster and is currently responsible for the Chapel: "The regular and ongoing shared worship in the Chapel and Parish church has allowed both congregations to meet, worship and work together in a mutually helpful and harmonious relationship," he says, continuing, "When many of our smaller rural chapels and churches are finding it difficult to maintain congregations and a regular pattern of worship, the ecumenical example at Luston offers a model which could be explored in many other locations. The temptation to 'hold on' and not consider any idea of change is understandable, but the model at Luston has been 'going strong' for half a century and can, therefore, claim to be very successful indeed!"

Revd Preb Mike Kneen, Rural Dean of Kington & Weobley (pictured bottom right, above) has also presided at the chapel in recent years: "I have fond memories of Luston Chapel. We provided a 'minister' for Luston once a month on the Leominster Team Service Rota. It was (and still is, I'm sure) a great place to go, with a warm welcome from the congregation and the prospect of coffee and good biscuits afterwards, so all the Leominster clergy

and lay Ministers enjoyed visiting."

[On] May 25th and 26th, the Christian community in Luston will celebrate the 50th anniversary weekend with a Saturday morning walk up the lane from the village pump in Luston to the parish church at Eye, followed by a walk across the fields to the chapel for coffee and cakes, then a Sunday service at the chapel with the Methodist Superintendent (the Methodist equivalent of a Bishop) Rev Richard Hall, taking the service, followed by refreshments. A Time to Mourn, A Time to Dance is an hour-long professional production presented in-the-round with audiences on three sides.


