Reflection from Rev Duncan MacLean

Mission in times of Cultural Change

If someone were to ask you the question posed in Psalm 137:4, 'How shall we sing the Lord's song in a strange land?' the first response might be to state the obvious, that in our lifetime something major has happened in Western culture – the times they are a' changing! - and we find ourselves as Christians almost feeling exilic in nature, aliens and strangers in a world that no longer feels as familiar.

We know that in previous generations, cultural change was often a slow process, with only minor adjustments to social habits and ways of thinking being made. Now, change is neither subtle nor gradual but traumatic and immediate, seemingly unpredictable and random, and for that reason, impossible to plan or control. Somehow I feel that we need a new map for the communities and geography we inhabit.

Maybe our message now must be forwarded to new addresses because those we wish to share it with are often now inhabiting different places. "New forms of church are a "return to sender": a

rediscovery of the original Jesus story for each time, with diverse people in every place" wrote Helmut Theilike.

We need to find out where people now gather, otherwise we will be knocking on the wrong doors. People today seem to be in fear of stepping outside the boxes they create in their minds, and within their own 'castles', and we have to help them to risk, to journey, and to discover life. How?

"Jesus calls us, not to a new religion but to life" wrote Richard Rohr. I feel that those I come into contact with no longer want or need a faith that binds by superstition, rules and regulations. For people seek to live in the freedom of faith – free to be who I am.

We are all on a journey in a foreign land, living on the margins. How shall we sing the Lord's song in a strange land? A quote I remember, but sadly not the author, wrote that "The only way to justify the claims of the gospel is by living the way of life to which the gospel calls us".

In living this fresh expression, it is our prayer that in the goodness and grace of God we will be part of the 'enacting a fearful hope for society'. As the people of God we are 'blessed to be a blessing'.

In order to live faithfully in this changing and fragmented world, we have to be willing to explore the new terrain, which now needs a 4x4 flexible, adaptable vehicle. It's no longer a simple, straight road from A to B. In accepting the need to understand and engage with the changing culture we risk misunderstanding, even dare I say it - the charge of heresy - in order to obey the gospel 'imperative' of seeking God as a Person, a subject to be known and loved in relationship, rather than as Doctrine and Dogma, which limits God to our own understanding of 'truth'.

It is this context that makes it important to 'explore new ways of being church' and to keep living the question 'How shall we sing the Lord's song in a strange land?'. In this quest we should also be committed to not being afraid to listen, to ask questions, or to be converted to truth in whatever form and from whomever it may be presented.' It seems to me that the former Archbishop Ramsay spoke words of wisdom when he stated that he "wished to understand and even learn from theological views which were not his own, while at the same time commending a generous and tolerant orthodoxy." We want to retain an evangelical openness – to have strong convictions without turning them into arrogant certainties that polarise and stereotype.

'We can do worse than remember a principle, from the writings of H Butterfield in his book Christianity and History. A principle which gives us a firm rock and leaves the maximum elasticity

for our minds: the principle – "Hold to Christ and for the rest be totally uncommitted."

We could pray these words -

Lord wake us up to what needs doing,

And what needs undoing.

Wake us up to what must be let go,

And what to draw closer.

Wake us up to what enlarges love,

And what diminishes it.

In all parts of our lives,

Disturb us and wake us up.

Year of Engagement news: Growing Good – A Toolkit for Churches



BROUGHT TO YOU BY CUF⁺

The Growing Good Toolkit is a six-session course about deepening your church's engagement with your community. It is based on three years of research by Church Urban Fund with churches of different sizes, traditions and contexts from every diocese in England.

This **Introduction to the Toolkit** will be hosted by Revd Joe Simons (Diocesan Mission Enabler – Society) and facilitated by Polly Taylor from Church Urban Fund. It will explore the Growing Good material and a number of helpful case studies from very rural parishes, to help you understand how to use the Toolkit in your community.

The Toolkit is flexible and adaptable, providing a framework conversations about what will work for each church and community. The sessions include a mixture of content including videos, activities and discussion that encourages everyone in the group to contribute. The Toolkit helps churches acknowledge and celebrate what they're already doing as well as generating ideas for new activities.

Since the launch of the Toolkit, 2,000 churches have signed up to use it. A recent evaluation has been really positive demonstrating that Growing Good helps churches grow in:

1. knowledge about their local community,
2. confidence in their local mission,
3. hospitality and relationships.

The Toolkit will help you to be more aware of the needs and strengths of your local community and congregation, more confident about sharing your faith through social action and better equipped to build partnerships with other organisations in your community.

This is a family friendly event, most suitable for children age 7 and up. Bring the whole family and be part of the story!

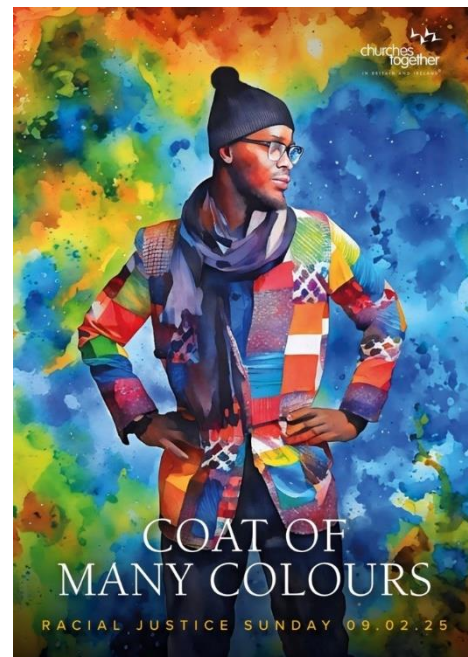

Churches Together in England launched Coat of Many Colours on 9th February—a special edition Spotify playlist for Racial Justice Sunday, featuring incredible music from Caribbean and African UK artists.

Brought to you by Churches Together in England (CTE), Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI) and [SongShare](#), this playlist is a celebration of unity, faith, and the power of music to inspire racial justice.

The SongShare platform empowers Black Christian songwriters by providing a centralised space to register and share their work. Worship leaders and other users can access songs via lyrics, chord sheets, multitracks, and instructional videos. The system's search functionality—by author, theme, or keyword—removes reasons for not discovering or using these resources. Additionally, SongShare will partner with churches to incorporate these songs into worship events and other programmes.

This year's Racial Justice Sunday Special Edition Playlist on Spotify serves as both an

introduction to SongShare and a call to action. By embracing these songs, churches across Britain and Ireland can reflect the vibrant diversity of their congregations while fostering greater unity through worship.

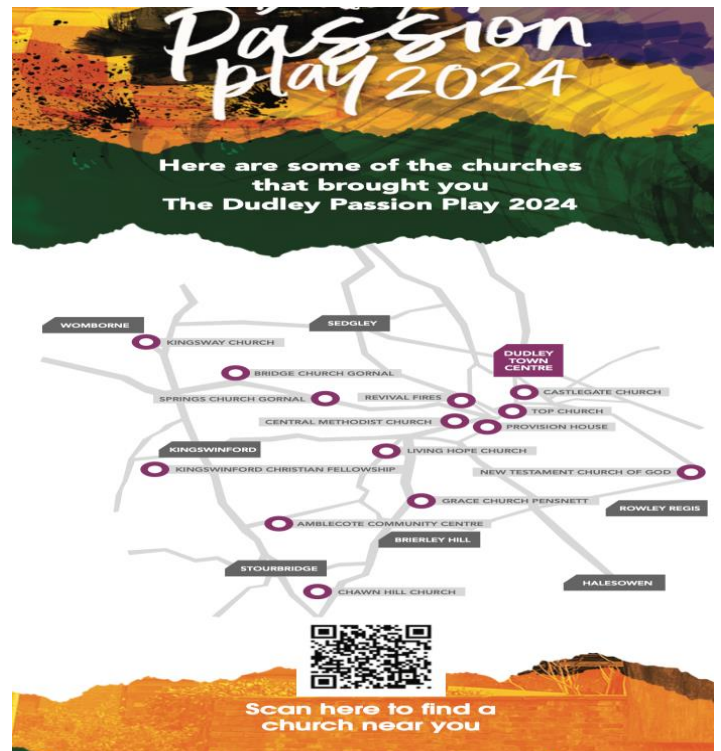

Association for Church Editors 2025 Awards

How good is your church magazine?

The search is on for Britain's best church magazine. Entries are now invited for the annual competition run by the Association for Church Editors (ACE), which is an independent, not for profit organisation.

"Judging from the number of brochures and leaflets that land on our doormats and the array of magazines in newsagents, other organisations still value printed material" says Sally Churchus, Chair of the national organisation, "so we are keen to encourage church editors everywhere".

For the coming 2025 competition, which closes on Tuesday 8th April, awards will be made for any size of magazine using just

black and white printing. (Coloured paper is allowed). The Gold Award winner will receive the John King Trophy, a silver baptismal shell to be held for one year, while Silver and Bronze Award winners will receive an inscribed trophy to keep, together with a Certificate of Excellence for display.

A panel of judges assesses each magazine, giving points for various aspects including clarity of the Christian message, cover design, headlines, overall layout and structure, use of graphics and appeal to intended readership. The prize-giving will take place at our annual meeting in September, which is open to everyone and includes talks about how to improve your magazine.
