Reflection on Commemorating 1700 Years of the Nicene Creed

I do like a nice creed in a liturgy, however us Methodists tend to only use them on high days and holidays. So we roll them out in our Easter Day, and Covenant Services. It's good at times to remind ourselves what we believe in, even if the language is sometimes seen as a bit archaic.

It's easy to forget at times how much division there has been in the church over its history, and the Nicene Creed was an attempt in the early years of the church to have an agreed statement on belief. Today it is one of the few theological texts shared across most Christian traditions; making it a powerful symbol for unity and dialogue.

The word Creed comes from the Latin word *credo* which means "I believe" and is the first word of the creed in Latin - *Credo in unum Deum* – "I believe in one God".

Back in 325 AD there was trouble brewing. Arius (c. 256–336 CE) was a Christian presbyter (elder) and theologian from Alexandria, Egypt, and he had been teaching that was a time when Jesus the Son did not exist. Or in his words "There was a time when

the Son was not." In other words, he was saying:-

- Jesus Christ (the Son of God) is not eternal.
- He was created by God the Father before time, and although exalted, is not equal to God.
- The Son is subordinate to the Father — a kind of divine intermediary.

Arius believed this preserved monotheism and upheld the absolute uniqueness of God the Father.

As you can imagine to many early Christians, especially Bishop Athanasius of Alexandria, Arius's teaching threatened the core of Christian salvation:

- If Christ is not truly God, then how can he reveal God or truly save humanity?
- If Jesus is a created being, even the highest one, he is not divine in the same way as the Father.

This led to sharp divisions in the Church.

Constantine the Great (c. 272–337 CE) was a Roman emperor who reigned: 306–337 CE (sole ruler from 324), he had recently converted to Christianity, and he convened the first Ecumenical Council in Nicea (modern-day Iznik, Turkey), as the divisions were threatening the unity of the Church and the stability of his

Empire. Constantinople in Turkey is named for Constantine.

The outcome of the Council of Nicea, was that the council rejected Arianism, and it produced the original Nicene Creed, declaring Christ as “of one substance” (Greek: *homoousios*) with the Father.

Later in 381 CE, the Council of Constantinople revised and expanded the Creed into the version most churches use today—technically the Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed.

Was this the end to disagreements? – No, just the beginning, the Nicene Creed set a theological benchmark, but the meaning of *homoousios* was fiercely contested for decades; even centuries. These disputes led to ongoing theological civil wars in the 4th century, contributed to imperial power struggles and echoed in later schisms and theological identities.

Bishop Mike Royal from Churches Together in England in answering the question “Why is Nicaea relevant to our Member Churches today?” Offers this statement:- “The unity that Member Churches enjoy as part of Churches Together in England is firstly and primarily based on what we believe about the nature of God and the centrality of Christ in the Christian faith. That meeting in AD 325 in Nicaea, in what is now part of modern Türkiye, established a clear understanding of the nature of Christ and the centrality of his life, death and resurrection for our salvation. The great thing about 1700 years of Nicaea is we have a chance to really celebrate what unites us together.”




