In June 2023 we held our first Counties Connect Celebration in a Barn on our family farm. We had the space in our barn following the sale of the milking cows a year earlier and we wanted to use the farm for the gospel. The aim was to celebrate all the good things that God was doing through local churches in contrast to the trials that came with Covid-19. It was so well

attended and received, that we moved to a bigger barn the following year with more food, camping options and additional venues added for children under 11.

This year we have changed the name to BarnFest and added more venues for children and young people to make it a complete family event. I would like to encourage you to come along and join us for all or part of the weekend. You may even like to bring your whole church along! Last year 43 different churches were represented and this year already 9 churches are planning to relocate their Sunday Service to the barn on the 6th July.

Our theme for the weekend will be Encounter Jesus with special guest speaker J John bringing two keynote messages. The Saturday evening will have a strong evangelistic focus and Sunday morning will have more of a celebratory focus. We are adding 4 marquees in the field alongside the barn for children and young people to have age relevant programmes running during the two main sessions so that they can encounter Jesus too.

A new feature this year will be to start with lunch (you will need to book for food) on the Saturday followed by an afternoon of games on the field for families and seminars and live music by our refreshment marquee. The games will include; Inflatable Assault Course, Bungee Run, Bouncy Castles, the Faith Space Van (games, consols and activities), Volley ball, Garden games, Table Tennis challenge and more!

Entry will be free to all but you will need to register for the event and book in advance for food which will have a modest cost. Hot and cold drinks will be provided throughout the weekend free of charge and camping this year will also be free. Donations towards costs will be welcomed. Through the Roof



Anxiety levels soar among disabled people!

Proposed cuts to disability benefits are causing rising levels of anxiety among disabled people, according to Through the Roof, the Christian charity that works together with churches and people across all disabilities to advance God's kingdom.

Lynda, a disabled volunteer with Through the Roof, currently receives Personal Independence Payments (PIP), which are designed to help people with long-term conditions manage daily living tasks. However, under the government's proposed new criteria, Lynda would no longer qualify for the Daily Living component – despite being a full-time wheelchair user and incomplete paraplegic – which leaves her uncertain about the future.

She says “I haven't met anyone who has said that they don't want to work. The problem is that many of us have conditions which make the logistics of travelling to work and finding work in suitably adapted premises very difficult. For others, working from home isn't possible because of fluctuating medical needs e.g. on-going therapy or continence care. Conditions

which cause chronic pain make concentration and focusing on work tasks impossible. Others struggle within the workplace due to mental health needs.”

For Lynda, the benefits she receives help cover essential costs, including repairs to her stairlift, which has broken down twice this month, and payments for her adapted wheelchair. These funds also help with heating costs, as her condition makes her more vulnerable to the cold.

“Life is hard,” admits Lynda, “but I'm fortunate because I have a working husband. Many disabled people live alone, and I don't know what will happen to them! While many disabled people do work and find fulfilment in their jobs, we must remember that support and understanding needs to be given to those who have conditions which, through no fault of their own, mean they are unable to work.”

Lynda calls on churches and the wider Christian community to be more attuned to the needs of disabled people and make adjustments that enable everyone to flourish and use their gifts to build others up:

“Let's listen to one another,” Lynda encourages. “Let's hear the worries and concerns of those who are struggling. We must be aware of the resources available through organisations that can offer assistance. As a Christian community, we can provide comfort, encouragement, and hope. In Jesus's name, we are called to offer support and rest, especially in times of distress. As He said in **Matthew 11:28**, 'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest.'”

Through the Roof invites churches to nominate their own [Roofbreaker](#) (Disability Champion) to reflect on the needs of individuals and ensure disabled people can fully **Access** the Christian life, **Belong** together as God's family, and use their gifts to make disciples, for God's glory, as part of the Great **Commission**.

Saltmine Passion Play 2025




**Passion Play on the streets of Hereford
